Working as a certified registered nurse anesthetist at MUSC Main Hospital for more than 20 years in a row with additional stints in the MICU, Neonatal ICU, and GI floor, alumna Theresa Morgan, CRNA, MHS has dedicated her professional career to MUSC's mission.

What inspired you to pursue nursing?

In considering a career for my life at the age of 19, I was inspired by my best friend of my childhood, Bethany Holly Robinson. CA1 SIMULATION BOOT CAMP BY HANNAH BELL, MD

In June, we hosted our first Mechanical Circulatory Support (MCS) Bootcamp for the rising CA-1 class. As many of you know, when our Anesthesia Critical Care Division assumed 24/7 coverage of the CVICU, our prior coverage responsibilities in the MSICU shifted completely to our Pulmonary Critical Care colleagues. Concurrent with this shift has been an initiative to move our residents with us to CVICU for ICU rotations. During the 2023-2024 academic year, our CA-1 class began rotating in the CVICU. Historically, residents have not been exposed to mechanical circulatory support focused education prior to the rotation. This was seen as a huge disadvantage to our residents, given that 80% of our institutional VA-ECMO cases and the overwhelming majority of IABP and Impella -supported patients are encountered and cared for in our CVICU.



Last year, Dr. Katie Hatter introduced the rising CA-1's to management of patients with Left Ventricular Assist Devices for noncardiac surgery as part of a research project. The time previously allotted for this project became available this year, and Dr. Guldan approached me about using this time to incorporate some MCS education for the residents. The eighteen rising CA-1s were divided into groups of six to optimize learning conditions. The course was divided into three separate sessions: IABP and Impella hosted by our Impella representatives and our MCS coordinators Lindsay Bull and Kaylen Dodson; ECMO with Monika Cardona, our institutional ECMO Manager; and LVAD with me and Jennifer Hajj, our institutional Program Manager for MCS. Sessions combined didactics with some hands-on learning. Topics covered in didactic sessions included pump design and modality, parameters, pump physiology with some focus on patient management. For the LVAD portion, Jennifer Hajj and I led a simulation session incorporating Dr. Hatter's scenarios. Learning efficacy was evaluated objectively for the ECMO portion of the course with Pre-and Post-Course Exams with an improvement in average scores from 67% to 83%.

While there is inevitably room for improvement with future iterations (e.g. more physician involvement in the ECMO/IABP/Impella portions for management perspectives) and while residents did express concern for whether they would be able to retain information until their CVICU rotation if it was in the latter half of the year, I remain hopeful that our efforts will have flattened the learning curve just a bit and will improve patient safety and resident's ability to collaborate effectively as part of the interdisciplinary team.
