MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN: RESIDENT INTERVIEWS; THE ZOOM EXPERIENCE

The department has completed our first month of resident candidate interviews for the Class of 2025. It has not been business as usual. As a reminder, we are recruiting for a class of fifteen residents. This year we had approximately 1,500 candidates submit their applications. A typical year sees an applicant pool of 1,100. This is over a 30% increase! The candidates have been outstanding as well.

The increased applicant phenomenon has been playing out in



high quality programs like ours in anesthesiology and other departments throughout the country. The main reason is felt to be the fact that all interviews this year have been mandated to be virtual by the ACGME. Applicants can apply to a lot of additional programs and not have to worry about the resulting travel cost and logistics. A typical applicant may normally apply to 20 anesthesia programs. This year they may be applying to 40 programs as an example.

Prior to the onset of the interview season, the department revamped our resident section on our website and created a short video highlighting the department, MUSC and Charleston.

In addition, we did several "Meet and Greet" informational sessions with our Program and Associate Program Directors, Dr. GJ Guldan and Dr. Joel Sirianni, respectively. Over 200 candidates participated. Our residents did an outstanding job on social media platforms highlighting our program and life as a resident in Charleston. Finally, GJ and Joel both participated in an American Society of Anesthesiology website interview. All this resulted in a further increase in our applicant pool.

This increase applicant pool has created unique opportunities and challenges. The first is how does one go from 1,500 applicants to an interview pool of \sim 160? The answer is very carefully. Dr. Guldan, I, and a team of faculty each reviewed hundreds of completed packets to try to identify individuals who had the necessary academic and social credentials to be successful in our program. From there, we attempted to identify their interest in MUSC and ties to our community. In previous years, we would have been able to consider visiting rotating students as well. Unfortunately, students were not allowed to rotate to other institutions this year.

Laura Matthews and Elizabeth Morrison have done a remarkable job creating a virtual Zoom environment for our applicant interviews. Each candidate interviews with the Chairman, Residency Program Director, two faculty and a Chief resident. In addition, they participate in resident chat rooms and other virtual settings to get a feel for our program and culture.

I have been very impressed with the quality of the interactions which includes the ability to learn about each candidate and their ability to learn about us. Even though we are early in this process, I am confident that we will recruit an outstanding class of future anesthesiologists. I am looking forward to introducing the Class of 2025 to you after the annual Match in March.

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COVID 19 PROTOCOL UPDATES

Preoperative Screening

At MUSC we continue to require testing prior to procedures requiring anesthesia. Overall positivity rates for preoperative patients are currently around 4%, with the majority being in the trauma and L&D categories. Positive rates for elective cases have been 2.4%, which is stable. For patients coming from home, testing is required within 4 days and inpatients must have a test within 7 days. We continue to ask that our patients be tested at our MUSC sites or at our affiliates, and nasopharyngeal PCR testing currently remains our testing of choice. We have been in discussions with our ID colleagues and other institutions regarding the introduction of nasal swabs into our testing strategy.

The Anesthesia Patient Safety Foundation recently updated their COVID testing strategies webpage, and many institutions have begun using nasal swabs for perioperative screening. MUSC has acquired the new ABOTT ID NOW Point of Care PCR test which uses a nasal swab. The test is run immediately and provides results in 15 minutes. These tests have been placed in the Emergency rooms at ART, UH and SJCH and will be used for our Level 1 and 2 surgical patients. Labor and Delivery will begin using one as well the week of December first. DDC has also acquired one, and they have been using it for patients who were unable to get tested in the community. The sensitivity of a nasal swab is a little less than a NP swab, but we feel confident that this testing strategy is still adequate as a day-of, rapid testing technique. Our Lab and ID colleagues will be doing a validation study on asymptomatic patients using the ABOTT ID NOW as we would like to potentially expand its use to allow for more day of testing for out-of-town patients and allow nasal swabs for patients for both convenience and comfort. We are planning on getting the ABOTT ID NOW for ART, SJCH and UH ORs in December. RT OR may be supported by the one housed in the ENT clinic in RT. More to come on this topic in the coming weeks, so stay tuned.

Care Team Members (CTM) Testing and Self-Monitoring

We continue to follow the MUSC Health guidelines for testing and self-monitoring. CTMs are expected to continuously be self-monitoring for symptoms of COVID. When exposed to someone who is COVID positive, CTMs are still expected to report/stay at work and continue to self-monitor. CTMs will be tested for COVID-19 when symptomatic. Testing capacity at MUSC remains very good and turnaround times for results are between 8-12hrs. Please continue to use the Virtual Care for testing, and let us know if you need help getting scheduled.

COVID Education and Protocols

We have been fortunate that our COVID census has not increased in several weeks, but we should always be prepared. Our educational materials and protocols are on the Department Website. We will continue to update those as we continue to learn about COVID and our experience with managing these patients in the ORs grow.








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MUSC EMAIL SECURITY UPDATES- DAILY DIGEST EMAILS


Beginning Wednesday, November 18, MUSC email users will begin receiving a Daily Digest email as shown below:



The Daily Digest Email serves to give users more control and visibility into emails sent to their addresses from external email accounts by providing a daily list of sender addresses, subjects, and how to take further actions on those emails.

The Allow Sender link will add the sending email address to a "Safe Senders" list that will help ensure that users future emails will not get filtered by any of the Proofpoint email filtering. Alternatively, the Block Sender link will add that user to a block list that will keep any further emails from them from reaching the intended inbox.

These lists can be managed by using the Manage My Account link which will look as below and allow a user to allow/block senders as well as seeing other email that has previously been quarantined due to spam.



Data Loss Prevention

The Information Security team is also introducing another feature to MUSC's email service that will help block the inadvertent sending of sensitive data (Social Security Number, Credit Card Information, etc.) to external email addresses which can potentially cause a security incident. When Proofpoint detects information that appears to be sensitive, the MUSC user who sent it will receive an email like the following image:

The user will have two options, Send Encrypted or Block. If the Send Encrypted link is used, then Proofpoint will re-process the email in order to send it securely using the Send Secure Encrypted email method. If Block is chosen, then the email will be blocked and discarded. If no option is chosen within 30 minutes of the email detection, then the email will continue to be sent using Send Secure Encrypted mail.
