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

RESIDENT INTERVIEWS CONCLUDE





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WAKE UP SAFE QUARTERLY REPORT CONTINUED...

DEVELOP LEADERSHIP AND ORGANIZATION

Membership has increased to 32 institutions with the addition of Akron Children's and Kaleida Health (Buffalo). Two other institutions are in the process of joining. We now are at a breakeven number of institutions and the addition of more institutions will increase funds available for improvement work. We just had our Fall meeting on Sunday October 23. At that meeting we elected officers for the next two years. They are Butch Uejima President, Dan Roke, President-Elect, and Dean Kurth, Past President.

WUS is exploring collaboration with ACS Pediatric Surgical Verification Program and AQI to improve quality improvement with pediatric surgeons and data sharing with ASA. Formal proposals will need to be discussed with SPA and WUS membership if they materialize.

STANDARDIZE REPORTING TO THE DATABASE

We continue to work with members to improve reporting to the database. Since the last report one additional institution is up to date with demographic data. President Kurth made several calls to departmental chairs to inquire why case reports were behind, with significant results. During September more than twice the usual number of cases were reported.

There is considerable variability in the case-reporting rate that is some institutions report events at a much higher rate than others. We are working to understand the reasons for the variability so that we can address the issues involved. There is variation in reporting of laryngospasm. In summary laryngospasm alone is not a reportable event, but is reportable if oxygen saturation is less the 60% for longer than 30 seconds. There is also some variability in reporting unanticipated ICU or hospital admissions. The issue was referred to the QI and Education committee to review the issues and develop a recommendation.

We reviewed progress with peer visits. During these visits an anesthesiologist or several anesthesiologists visit an institution and spend a day in the operating room. They look for good ideas that might be spread to other institutions and provide a critique of areas that could be improved in the visited institution. We have completed 21 visits. In general they have been perceived as helpful and enumerate areas that need improvement.

A small group reviewed the peer visit program and made suggestions to the group at the meeting. These suggestions include:

- 1. Develop a pre-visit questionnaire to assess Quality Improvement capability and resources, to learn about ongoing QI projects, and to discover areas that the institution might need help with.
- 2. Develop a process to do a follow up two years after a visit to measure progress.
- 3. Increase the number of members making visits.
