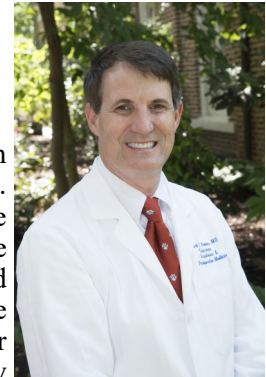

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN: LATHA HEBBAR, MD, ENDOWED CHAIR IN ANESTHESIOLOGY

It is with great enthusiasm that I announce the creation of the Dr. Latha Hebbar Endowed Chair in Anesthesiology. This endowed chair has been created to recognize the substantial contributions of Dr. Hebbar to the department. She has frequently been awarded the resident teacher of the year and has dedicated her professional life to the development of the next generation of anesthesiologists. She has taken her love for resident education and expanded it to include faculty development in her role as the Vice Chair for Faculty Development. The whole department owes her a debt for our personal and professional development. I cannot think of another person that emphasizes what it means to be an academic anesthesiologist, mentor and friend. As the COVID pandemic starts to dissipate, the department will hold several events in her honor in the months ahead and provide you an opportunity to contribute to the endowment. A short bio of her life follows below. Please congratulate her on a significant milestone in her career.

Dr. Latha Hebbar was born in the Indian state of Kerala, and was raised in Chennai, a vibrant city on the southeastern coast of India. In 1984, she completed her medical degree at the Madras Medical College, Madras University. In 1987, she completed her residency in anesthesiology at the All-India Institute of Medical Sciences, New Delhi. She then moved to the United Kingdom (UK) in 1988, where she continued her anesthesia training with the Northwest Regional Authority of the National Health Service. She went through the ranks of her UK training in the Manchester hospitals and was board certified as a Fellow of the Royal College of Anaesthetists in 1991. She is also board certified from Dublin, Ireland in 1991 and is a

Fellow of the Faculty of Anaesthetists at the Royal College of Surgeons of Ireland. In 1994, Dr. Hebbar moved to the United States and joined the Department of Anesthesia and Perioperative Medicine at the Medical University of South Carolina, where she completed her residency in the Clinical Scientist track graduating in 1995. She was awarded first place in the American Society of Anesthesiologists (ASA) resident research competition for her work on the effect of propofol on cardiomyocyte contractility. She continued at MUSC, as a Basic Science Anesthesiology Research Fellow for two years doing extensive research in the field of cardiac-thoracic anesthesia. In 1996, she was board certified by the American Board of Anesthesiology (ABA).

In 1997, Dr. Hebbar joined the department faculty as an Assistant professor and has been an integral part of the various missions of the department. In 2005, she was promoted to Full Professor. During her initial 24 years, she has served as the Program Director for the Residency Program, Medical Director of Non-Operating Room Anesthesia, Chair of the Quality Improvement Committee, Chair of the of the Resident Clinical Competency Committee, Director of Obstetric Anesthesiology and, most importantly, Vice Chair for Faculty Development. As Vice Chair for Faculty Development, she has promoted and developed a robust departmental faculty mentoring program. She is the founding faculty member of the College of Medicine's Anesthesia Interest Group and continues to serve as a mentor for aspiring medical students interested in anesthesiology. In 2017, she was named the Claudia Oxner Simmons Endowed Chair in Anesthesiology. Dr. Hebbar's clinical interests include obstetric, liver transplantation and neuro-anesthesia.

Dr. Hebbar has been very engaged in research both as a principal investigator and in mentoring junior faculty with their research efforts. Her basic science cardiac research focused on the impact of anesthesia medications and novel cardioplegic solutions on cardiomyocyte contractility in healthy and failing hearts; obstetric research included labor analgesia modalities, post cesarean pain management strategies and healthcare disparities in the parturient.

She is well published with over 130 presentations and publications in obstetric, transplant, cardiothoracic, and other prominent anesthesia journals. She has addressed academic communities at international, national, and regional meetings. She is an active member of her professional societies and is a contributing author to ASA's Continuing Medical Education publications in both general and obstetric anesthesiology areas.

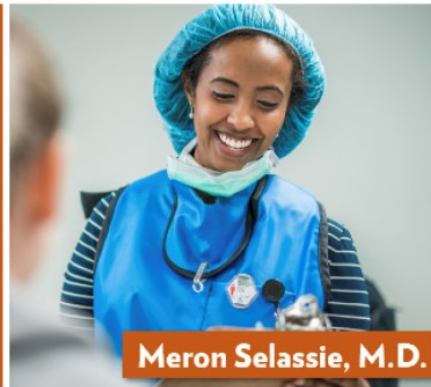

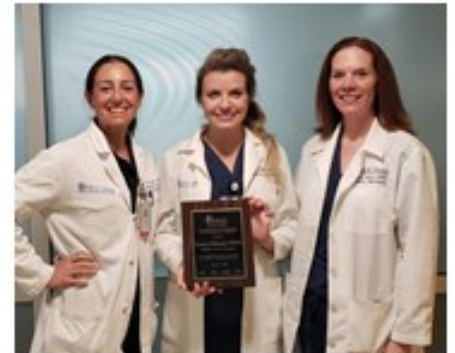

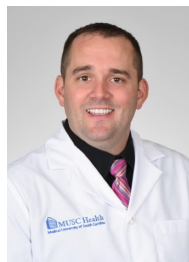

VASOACTIVE SECONDARY INFUSION LABEL GO LIVE THIS WEEK

This week we will go live with the secondary labels for vasopressor infusions. Thank you to everyone who participated in the surveys regarding the design of the labels. The goal of this system is to reduce the number of medication errors related to infusions in the OR by utilizing a highly visible medication label similar to what we currently use for syringes. The secondary labels will be located in the OR pharmacies at ART, SJCH, and UH. Ambulatory facilities are excluded at this time. The labels will be in the OR pharmacy and the workflow will be for the anesthesia provider to apply a secondary label to the infusion when they remove it from the pharmacy. SJCH will have labels for both pediatric and adult concentrations. It is important not to obscure the existing label when placing the secondary label (see pictures below). Our pharmacy colleagues will be assisting with placing these labels on our afterhours stock. Be on the lookout for a survey regarding your experience with these labels in the coming weeks. 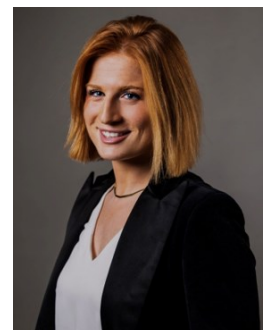
MEET TIFFANY LITTLE, ANESTHESIA TECH

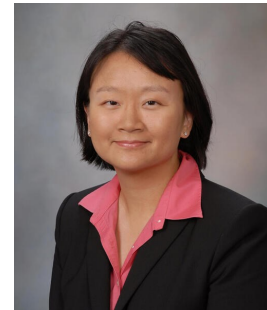
