Prescription Drug Take Back

The Mt. Pleasant Police Department will be on site with a prescription drug take back box. Proper drug disposal addresses a crucial public safety and public health issue. According to the 2016 National Survey on Drug Use and Health, 6.2 million Americans misused controlled prescription drugs. The study shows that a majority of abused prescription drugs were obtained from family and friends, often from the home medicine cabinet.



Changing What's Possible

New Geriatric Medicine Fellowship

A new Geriatric Medicine Fellowship program at MUSC has received initial accreditation and is seeking applicants to begin their training in July 2019.

Led by Program Director Mark A. Newbrough, M.D., associate professor in the Division of General Internal Medicine, this new fellowship program will address a critical need in South Carolina by training physicians to become specialists in the care of older adults. This is especially important now because South Carolina is one of the most rapidly aging states in the U.S. By 2023, 25% of the Lowcountry’s population will reach age 65 or older, making it the fastest growing segment of the Lowcountry’s population. MUSC, and its Division of General Internal Medicine, is actively growing clinical, education, and research programs to meet the specialized health related needs of older adults and their families. The Geriatric Medicine Fellowship program will serve as an anchor for a variety of efforts aimed at ensuring the Lowcountry has a qualified and stable workforce to meet those needs for decades to come.

Newbrough joined MUSC in October 2016 from the University of Virginia where he served as section head for geriatrics and medical director for Blue Ridge PACE (Program for All-inclusive Care of the Elderly) for four years. Other key clinical faculty include William Moran, M.D., Amanda Overstreet, D.O., and Julianna Marwell, M.D.

The Accreditation Council for Graduate Medicine Education (ACGME) approved the geriatrics program in September 2018 for two fellowship slots annually for the one-year training program.

Service: The “Traveling Brain”

We all hear a lot of information about brain health these days: what to eat, what not to eat, how much physical activity to get... We even hear about how social engagement is key to preventing cognitive decline. With all of our effort and focus on protecting this miraculous organ, not many can say they have been able to engage with an actual human brain!

Brain Awareness Week (BAW) is the global campaign to increase public awareness of the progress and benefits of brain research. Every March, BAW unites the efforts of partner organizations worldwide in a celebration of the brain for people of all ages. Activities are limited only by the organizers’ imaginations and include open days at neuroscience labs; exhibitions about the brain; lectures on brain-related topics; social media campaigns; displays

at libraries and community centers; classroom workshops; and more.

MUSC participates in Brain Awareness Week every year, but there is a year-round volunteer program where schools and other groups can request that the “traveling brain” come to them with a whole preserved human brain, spinal cord, human brain sections, rat brain, and mouse brain. Depending on the area of study or interest, graduate students will present on various topics related to the brain and its functions.

In addition to local schools, recently seniors at Daniel Point Retirement Community had a chance to check out the brains and spinal cord during a presentation by Dr. Heather Boger. As you can see, their excitement and enthusiasm was contagious!
