Methods: What approaches were used? Describe how you went about solving the problem or exploring the issue identified in the introduction.

Results: What did you find? This section should list the results or outcomes of the work you have done so far.

Conclusion: What did you learn? Give a brief statement of the project's implications and contributions to its field.

Type of Project: (clinical or basic science, epidemiology, etc.)

Mentor's Name: Name and title

As a reminder, here are the Abstract Word Document Guidelines:

- Abstract Length: Approximately 300 words. No more than 1 page.
- Abstract must be submitted as a Word Document. Please make sure it is the final version (no track changes showing).
- Style/Font: Arial 11
- Abstract should be structured in the following sections:
 - o Abstract Title
 - Participant's Name (include Title, Division, and Department of Medicine Affiliation)
 - o Introduction
 - o Methods
 - o Results
 - \circ Conclusion
 - Type of Project
 - Mentor's Name
- If you submit an abstract and are affiliated with the Department of Medicine, you may be asked to present as an oral presenter.
- Presenting authors may submit one abstract only.
