VALUES

- ARE PERSONAL AND DEFINED AS:
 - A PRINCIPLE, STANDARD OR QUALITY ONE CONSIDERS INHERENTLY WORTHWHILE OR DESIRABLE
 - THEY ARE WHAT MOTIVATE AND FULFILL US.....
 - IN ESSENCE, A VALUE IS WHAT IS IMPORTANT TO US AND DEFINES AS INDIVIDUALS.... IT GIVES OUR LIVES MEANING

 - RESPONSIBILITIES IN PRACTICE SETTINGS (10)
 - RESPONSIBILITIES AS PROFESSIONALS (8)

Ethical Decision Making Model

- Social workers are encouraged to use ethical decision-making models that promote critical thinking and reflection.
- A multitude of ethical decision-making models exist.
- The following model, or ethical decision-making steps, is an accumulation of aspects from the models included in the literature and is based on a best practice approach



RANK ORDER THESE PRINCIPLES

- Guaranteeing the self-determination and autonomy of my clients
- Assuring social justice for my clients
- Ensuring my decisions cause "the least harm"
- Guaranteeing confidentiality and privacy to my clients
- Protecting my client's life
- Always being truthful and transparent

- SOCIAL WORK VALUES (6) FROM THE NASW CODE OF ETHICS
 - SERVICE
 - SOCIAL JUSTICE
 - DIGNITY AND WORTH OF THE PERSON
 - IMPORTANCE OF RELATIONSHIP
 - INTEGRITY
 - COMPETENCE

MORALS VS. ETHICS

- MORALS GUIDE AN INDIVIDUAL IN DECIDING "RIGHT AND WRONG", "GOOD OR BAD".....
- ETHICS ARE PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS THAT DEFINE "APPROPRIATE VS. INAPPROPRIATE"
- OUR VALUES AND MORALS CAN SOMETIMES CONFLICT WITH ETHICAL STANDARDS.....
- EXAMPLES.....



ETHICAL PRINCIPLES

 PRINCIPLES ARE IDEALS OR GUIDEPOSTS ALL SOCIAL WORKERS SHOULD ASPIRE TO

 EACH OF THE PREVIOUS VALUES HAVE AN ETHICAL PRINCIPLE THAT FLOWS FROM IT



NASW ETHICAL PRINCIPLES

- OUR PRIMARY GOAL IS TO HELP PEOPLE IN NEED....
- WE SHOULD CHALLENGE SOCIAL INJUSTICE WHERE IT EXISTS....
- EACH PERSON HAS DIGNITY AND WORTH....
- WE HELP PEOPLE BY BUILDING A RELATIONSHIP WITH EACH PERSON....



ETHICAL PRINCIPLES...

 WE ACT IN A TRUSTWORTHY WAY WITH CLIENTS AND PROMOTE ETHICAL PRACTICES IN OUR ORGANIZATIONS....

 WE STRIVE TO ENHANCE OUR KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS AND APPLY THEM IN PRACTICE....




Ethical Rules Screen

- With the Ethical Rules Screen, Dolgoff provides a step to help social workers understand that the Code takes precedent over their own personal values.
- A social worker who has done an ethical self- assessment will have a better appreciation of the values they hold that are personal versus those that they hold as a professional.
- The Ethical Rules Screen suggests that if one or more provisions of the Code apply, the Code should be followed.

Ethical Rules Screen

Examine the Code of Ethics to determine if any of the Code rules are applicable.

These rules take precedence over the worker's personal value system.





Ethical Principles Screen (EPS)

- When consulting the Code of Ethics, there may be times when the Code will not specifically address the dilemma, or when the Code provides conflicting guidance. In these instances, social workers may find it helpful to use the Ethical Principles Screen developed by Dolgoff, Loewenberg, & Harrington (2005).
- The ethical principles screen involves the ranking of ethical principles.
- Higher level principles take precedence over lower level ones in those situations where a specific code or standard may not apply.

Protection of Life

Social Justice

Self Determination, Autonomy, and Freedom

Least Harm

Quality of Life

Privacy and Confidentiality

Truthfulness and Full Disclosure



Rank Ordering Ethical Principles

Protection of Human Life

applies to all persons, it is the most basic of all rights

Social Justice

all persons in the same circumstances should be treated equally

Self determination, Freedom, and Autonomy

the clients right and ability to make their own decisions should be respected

Least Harm Principle

when faced with two options that have potential to cause harm you choose the option that will result in the least amount and least permanent harm



Rank Ordering Ethical Principles

Quality of Life

quality of the various domains of well being in a client's life

Right to Privacy and Confidentiality

professionals have a duty to protect the privacy of clients to the greatest extent possible consistent with laws and professional ethics

Fully Disclose all Relevant Information

social workers are expected to inform clients of the interventions they will be using, confidentiality, fees, potential outcomes, etc.





THE CASE OF JIMMY

 Jimmy is a passive, disturbed adolescent who is currently in the agency's residential program. He is frequently bullied by older residents. You have worked hard to find a less restrictive therapeutic foster home in his home community with the planned move in two weeks.... His mother is excited.....Then things change per your Supervisor....



ADMINISTRATIVE VS. CLINICAL DECISIONS

- You are informed by your Supervisor that the move must be cancelled due to budget considerations....
- Remaining in the agency's group placement would preserve a higher per diem rate and the financial picture currently is of concern to the CEO and Finance Director....

USING DOLGOFF'S ETHICAL PRINCIPLES

- USED WHEN ETHICAL STANDARDS ARE EITHER VAGUE OR IN CONFLICT WITH ONE ANOTHER....
- EXAMING THE "PYRAMID" FOR GUIDANCE....
- WHERE DO YOU END UP? WHAT IS YOUR COURSE OF ACTION NOW?





AN INNOCENT MAN IS IN PRISON

YOU ARE A THERAPIST IN AN INPATIENT ADDICTIONS CENTER..... YOU HAVE BEEN SEEING A MALE PATIENT FOR SOME TIME AND HAVE ESTABLISHED A GOOD RELATIONSHIP HE TELLS YOU IN SESSION THAT HE WAS INVOLVED IN A ROBBERY AND SHOT THE SECURITY GUARD, WHO LATER DIED....



YOUR DILEMMA

- HE SHARES THAT HE WAS NEVER CAUGHT BUT ANOTHER MAN WAS ARRESTED FOR THE CRIME, CONVICTED AND SENTENCED TO A LENGTHY PRISON TERM, WHERE HE NOW SITS....
- CONSULT BOTH RELEVANT STANDARDS
 BEFORE EXAMING THE ETHICAL PRINCIPLES
 PYRAMID....

 HE KNOW YOU ARE BOUND BY CONFIDENTIALITY AND REMINDS YOU OF THAT FACT....

 WHAT OTHER STANDARDS ARE RELEVANT HERE?



POTENTIAL HARM VS. CONFIDENTIALITY

- You are seeing a 15- year-old client therapy.
- You communicate your standard confidentiality statement in the first session.
- Later on, the client discloses she is dealing drugs with her 19 -year-old boyfriend, recently released from prison for dealing.
- Her parents have forbidden her from seeing him and want to know if she somehow is....



ETHICAL ISSUES PRESENTED TO THE THERAPIST

- Is there enough potential harm to the client to break confidentiality and inform the parents?
- Is there an ethical obligation to report the client's or her boyfriend's illegal behavior? To Whom and Why?
- What does the Ethical Principles Screen advise?
